

> the lesson, I told them why I was so angry. Later, one of the students gave me a card to apologize. I was so touched. I remember once after an S.2 girl received very positive final examination results and told me that she was delighted. She thought it was worthwhile to put a lot of effort into her studies. She

promised she would keep going and never give up. I was moved because I had only taught her for a year. Thirdly, I will always remember that students gave

me a surprise party on my birthday. It was touching.

Interviewer: What stands out in your teaching career?

I think the toughest moments are when I need to Miss Leung:

> finish lots of things near the end of the school term because of the rush to complete the curriculum. I need to set lots of questions for the examination paper and mark them after the examination in a short period of time. On the other hand, I am always so happy to see students who work hard and give me eye contact during my lesson. These are the happiest moments when I am teaching and it gives me support. I am always pleased to see the improvement

of my students.

Interviewer: Which university did you study at?

Miss Leung: I graduated from Lingnan University. And then I got a

masters degree from the Chinese University of Hong

Kong.

Interviewer: What are your hobbies?

My hobbies are reading and travelling. Miss Leung:

I helped them to translate into English. This experience inspired me and confirmed that learning English is very important. If you know how to speak English, you will find it so convenient. I have seen some people who are afraid to go into a Western restaurant because they cannot read the menu or order the dishes in English. If you are good at English, you will have a

wider horizon.
